

Centennial Olympic Park's Fountain of Rings Shaped like the Olympic rings, this interactive fountain features 251 computer-controlled water jets, 400 fog jets and 487 lights. Daily water shows are choreographed to Neil Diamond tunes or *The Little Mermaid*, but simply dashing into a ring and looking out through a wall of water is the most fun. See centennialpark.com.

Six Flags' White Water Whether you prefer sliding down The Cliffhanger, a thrilling freefall roughly nine stories high, or drifting lazily along the Little Hooch, White Water is a great place to go when you need to beat the heat. The Marietta facility is also a manageable size—which does a lot to help parents chill. Six Flags Over Georgia's Skull Island attraction, located within White Water's sister theme park, offers acres of water play minus the thrill rides. See sixflags.com.

Shooting the Hooch The days of the infamous Ramblin' Raft Race may be over, but you can still ride the Chattahoochee River via canoe, kayak or raft. Chattahoochee Outfitters will rent you the necessary equipment and shuttle you upstream from various outposts in North Atlanta. For shorter rides, rent a two- or four-man pedal boat at Azalea Park. And this year, they're launching the "Spirit of Roswell," a historic paddlewheel riverboat. See shootthehooch.com.

So with a digital thermometer, a few willing volunteers and an unquenchable thirst, we set off to find out which Atlanta tavern has the frostiest brew on tap. - B.W.

Taco Mac 1006 North Highland Ave., 404-873-6529	36.5 degrees, pint glass	Frosted glasses straight from the ice- box probably helped drop the temp below optimum.	Quick, friendly service. The extra chill tasted good to us—on average, the coldest beer tested.
Dark Horse Tavern 816 North Highland Ave., 404-873-3607	39.0 degrees, pint glass	We blew our cover by leaving notes behind on the bar.	Quick service and talkative bartenders are entertaining (and distracting).
Twisted Taco 66 12th St., 404-607-8771	36.7 degrees, pint glass	None that we remember, but did we mention the hot bartender?	Our very hot female bartender may have caused an unintentional warming of the product.
The Lodge 248 Buckhead Ave., 404-233-3345	38.2 degrees, plastic cup	Inquisitive patrons asked what the hell we were dipping in our beer. ("Wow, your job sucks, don't it?")	Not the coldest, but the closest to the ideal 38 degrees. Florida Gators fans, who know cold beer in hot climates, love it here.
CJ's Landing 270 Buckhead Ave., 404-237-7657	58 degrees (see margin of error), plastic cup	After we remembered to remove the the thermometer probe's protective sheath, the temp plunged to 38.5.	Well into our research, we screwed up our order too. But did the bartender have to yell, "You gotta ask for draft, bitch"?
